"The Garden as Mindfulness Mentor: How Digging in the Dirt Brings Focus to Mind, Spirit, and Camera"

Groff's Plant Farm (9:30 – 11:30 AM) 6128 Street Rd., Kirkwood, PA 17536 717-529-3001

Groff's has a wide selection of annuals, perennials, wildflowers, hostas, and shrubs. Their nursery will not open until late March, but they have thousands of varieties and many rare plants. They do arrange their plants by sun and shade requirements. Please note that they do not take credit cards so you must pay by check or cash. The nursery is closed on Sunday.

Conestoga seems to focus on trees and shrubs, both evergreen and deciduous forms. They often carry rare conifers and some perennials including tree peonies at inexpensive prices. Note that this nursery is closed on Tuesdays and Sundays.
