



Lovely Lepidote Rhododendrons

We had a great Fall Banquet in December! We enjoyed a delicious meal at Richard Bradshaw's estate and heard Steve Kristoph's excellent talk on "Lovely Lepidotes." Lepidote Rhododendrons really are great plants but they are not as widely grown in our area compared to other forms.

Lepidotes are the smaller leaf rhododendrons like 'P.J.M' that we call "scalies" because they have waxy scales on stems and leaves and some have aromatic foliage that deer dislike. The plants are often confused with azaleas since they have a similar stature but the flowers can come in some amazing colors. Check out the yellows, apricots, and the awesome blues that are never seen in azaleas!

We have trouble with certain Lepidotes that cannot take our heat but there are some that do quite well. *R. keiskei* from Japan makes a good rock garden plant and it is a light yellow. There are very dwarf forms of that species like 'Yaku Fairy' but it is harder to keep alive.

The blue dwarf *R. impeditum* is a lovely species but it is almost impossible to grow here. It is an alpine plant that cannot take our heat and humidity.

Augie Kehr's blush pink 'Southland' was derived from *R. keiskei* crossed with a Florida species called *R. minus* var. *chapmanii*. It has significant heat tolerance but so do many hybrids with another Eastern native species, *R. minus* var. *carolinianum*.

Nearing's apricot 'Mary Fleming' and light pink 'Windbeam' are excellent but they are not dwarf. They are medium size, comparable to an azalea. Lepidotes that are also medium in stature are bright pink 'Olga Mezitt' and 'Weston's Aglo'. Like 'PJM', they were developed from *R. minus* and *R. dauricum*, a species native to Eastern Siberia. They are not only winter hardy but also heat tolerant.

All Lepidotes require excellent drainage so even though they may be able to take heat and cold, they will not survive wet feet or sticky clay.

I wish I could grow *R. augustinii*. It is a tall plant that can reach 6 to 8 ft or more and is very impressive with flowers that can measure up to 3" across. The color typically ranges from shades of light to medium blue and purplish hues. It has trouble in our climate but there are some hybrids of it we can grow. One of the best is 'Blaney's Blue' which is a good deep blue, and 'Rhein's Luna' which is a lighter lavender blue.

My next project is to work on hardy blues. I am collecting blues. I purchased three forms of *augustinii* from the Species Foundation last year that I hope to keep alive long enough to make crosses. The trick is to raise as many seedlings as possible and plant them out without much special care. Then let natural selection eliminate the weaklings. Joe Gable did that with his species to get hardier forms. It's a plan!
